Get Endorsement

he WV AFL-CIO endorsement process is a long and thorough one. The decision is made to endorse a candidate only after a series of interviews. votes and review.

The process begins with a questionnaire that is mailed to all candidates - republican, democrat and independent.

Those candidates who send back the questionnaire are interviewed by a committee appointed by the Labor Council in

In the interviews, the candidates are asked, among other things, about their responses to the questionnaire.

The committee members vote.

on each candidate, whether to endorse, take no action, or not to endorse. The candidate needs a 2/3 majority to get an endorsement.

If the committee votes to endorse, the candidate moves on to the next stage in the process.

A vote for no action means local unions can elect to participateintheindividual'scampaign, but the AFL-CIO as a whole will not participate.

A vote not to endorse means the candidate does not support labor issues and local unions are encouraged not to participate in the individual's campaign at all.

If the committee decides to endorse the candidate, the labor council as a whole takes a vote.

ENDORSEMENT PROCESS

Again a 2/3 majority is needed to move on.

If the labor council as a whole votes to endorse the candidate, the next step is a vote by the WV AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education in which a 2/3 majority is needed to secure the endorsement.

"The decision to endorse a candidate is not a simple one," said ACT's B.B. Smith.

"Several people and several steps are involved.

"The AFL-CIO does its best to make certain the candidates it endorses will support labor issues if they are elected.

"However, in spite of the lengthy endorsement process, some candidates do not live up to expectations."

Building Trades Candidates



David Walker is running for the House of Delegates in the 33rd District.

He is the AFL-CIO's only endorsed candidate running in this district - Clay, Calhoun and part of Gilmer Counties.

Walkerhas been an active member of Operating Engineers Local

132 for 25 years.

"As a heavy equipment operator I know about the lack of job opportunities in our area.

"I think it's past time working families of West Virginia actually have a say in formulating the laws that govern them.

"While we struggle to pay our taxes, our lawmakers are cutting taxes for the big corporations.

"We need people in the Legislature looking out for our interests."



Diane Parker is a candidate for the House of Delegates in the 42nd District.

She lives in Grafton and is currently employed as Assistant Business Manager for the West Virginia Laborers' District Council and auditor for Laborers Local 814

Parker has been a member of Local 814 for nine years.

While Parker is not a member of the Building Trades, her experience with the Laborers has helped her understand the needs of construction workers and their families.

Parker supports quality, affordable education and health care for all West Virginians, as well as, attracting living wage job opportunities.

"I will fight to bring employment opportunities to this state so our children won't have to leave to find jobs paying a living wage."

AFL-CIO Candidate Questionnaire

- 1. PEIA Would you support legislation to protect the integrity of the Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA) without shifting the cost to public employees, in the forms of higher premiums, deductible, and co-pays?
- 2. COLLECTIVE BARGAIN-ING - A bill supported by the AFL-CIO has been introduced into the legislature providing the right of public employees to organize. The bill includes: (a) prohibition of strikes; (b) negotiations ending with binding arbitration, and (c) all cost items must be submitted to the appropriate governmental body for approval. Employees must achieve a simple majority within a unit to secure a union. A public employees board would be appointed by the governor to govern all proceedings. Would you support such a bill? If No, what provisions would you support?
- 3. PRIVATIZATION Would you oppose legislation designed to turn over the operation of any of various traditionally state-operated programs to private entities?
- 4. CIVIL SERVICE Would you support legislation extending Civil Service protection to employees working at the West Virginia Regional Jails, West Virginia Parkways, and the Economic Development Authority?
- 5. OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH Would you support legislation to cover all public employees, including those in Corrections, Health, and the Legislature, under the same basic safety and health considerations mandated by law for all workers in the private sector and some select public employees? Do you support funding for this legislation?
- 6. HATCH ACT There are currently three classification of citizens that are not permitted to run for political office in West Virginia: felons, the mentally impaired, and public employees. Would you support legislation that would permit public employees to run for political office?
- 7. CORRECTIONAL EMPLOY-EES - (a.) Would you support legislative efforts to fund a substantial pay increase for the West Virginia Division of Corrections, the West Virginia Division of Juvenile Services, and the Regional Jail employees, to bring their wages more in line with the national average and federal jurisdictions? (Currently they are paid as much as 20% less.)
- b. Would you support legislative efforts to provide full retirement benefits to the employees of the West Virginia Division of Corrections, the West Virginia Division of Juvenile Services, and the Regional Jail after 20 years of service and 55 years of age.
- 8. EDUCATION (a.) Would you support legislation that would system-

atically move teacher salaries to the national average? (b.) Would you oppose any legislation that would erode the working conditions of education employees, such as eliminating seniority and job bidding provisions? (c.) Would you support legislation that would allow education employees to retire when age and years of service equal 80?

9. WORKERS' COMPENSATION
- Would you support or oppose any effort to reduce workers' compensation benefits?

Would you support these measures to strengthen and better stabilize the Workers' Compensation Fund:

- a. Restoring continued benefits at Social Security age?
- b. Removing company doctor requirement?
- c. Restoring two year statute of limitations for filing a claim?
- d. Strengthening of nonpayment penalties and collection of delinquent accounts by employers?
- e. Reducing the Permanent Total Disability (PTD) threshold?
- 10. NON-PARTISAN JUDICIAL ELECTIONS Would you oppose non-partisan elections for Supreme Court justices, Circuit Court judges, and Magistrate Court judges?
- 11. TORT REFORM Do you believe existing laws should change to allow limits on lawsuits by limiting awards, restricting liability, and in general making it harder for people to bring lawsuits?
- 12. SELF-AUDIT BILL. Do you support legislation that would give an environmental audit privilege to businesses who conduct their own audits (this would mean that the audit results could *not* be used as evidence in legal proceedings)?
- 13. UNION SECURITY Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act of 1947 allows individual states the option of adopting "open shop" which outlaws mandatory union membership.

Section 9(a) of the same act, however, requires unions to represent all workers, members and non-members alike, with no provision for recuperation of the expense of that representation. This is commonly known as 'right to work.' Would you support a 'right-to-work' law in West Virginia?

- 14. NURSING HOME STAN-DARDS - Would you support a bill designed to clearly establish minimum nursing home standards, to eliminate inadequate staffing - a major problem in many nursing homes?
- 15. WEST VIRGINIA JOBS ACT For projects built in West Virginia, that are financed in whole or in part with West Virginia's tax dollars, would you support a bill requiring at least 90% of the work site employees to be West Virginia residents or residents from nearby states?
- 16. PREVAILING WAGE Most projects funded by public money have special minimum wages for construction workers called prevailing wages.

The purpose of using prevailing wages is to stop public construction from driving down wages in an area through low wage competition. The Department of Labor establishes what the prevailing wage is by surveying each community. Do you support the prevailing wage for West Virginia workers?

- 17. DEBARMENT Contractors who repeatedly violate laws, have a track record of poor performance, or are forbidden from bidding federal contracts should also be forbidden to bid on state and local contracts. Do you agree?
- 18. ELECTRICIANS LICENSES
 Will you support moving the administration, and enforcement of electricians' licensing to the state Department of Labor to increase efficiency and accountability?

Legislative performance audits of the State Fire Marshall have consistently shown licensing fees being used for purposes other than license administration and enforcement.

19. TAXES - Current administration proposals for major tax overhaul may lead to large breaks for the wealthiest individuals in our state, and tax increases for working families.

Real reform would include elimination or regressive taxes, like the food tax, and proper collection of taxes on natural resources. Would you commit to tax breaks for working families before any tax breaks for the wealthiest?

- 20. 'RIGHT-TO-KNOW'. In 1982, the Legislature excluded coal mining from the hazardous chemical Act. Would you support legislation to get coal mining properties and areas, and coal preparation plants, included once again in the "Right-to-Know" About Hazardous Chemicals legislation?
- **21.** MOUNTAIN-TOP MINING What is your position on mountaintop mining?
- 22. ECONOMIC DEVELOP-MENT Recent changes to state law allow economic development agencies to withhold information from the public regarding pending deals until the deal is final.

Those in favor say this secrecy is needed to protect potential companies from unwanted exposure and to prevent competing states from gaining an advantage.

Those against this measure say the public has a right to know what deals are being made, before it is finalized, especially when tax funds are being committed. What do you think?

23. LEGISLATIVE LEADER-SHIP - If elected, will you commit to not supporting a candidate for Speaker of the House or President of the Senate until after the Labor Endorsed Candidates Caucus meets?



While in Congress, he has had a strong record of supporting unions. In 1998 Wise voted to stop H.R. 3246 which made organizing harder for workers.

He also voted against H.R. 2608 which would have restricted unions' ability to participate in political and legislative activities.

In 1999 Wise voted yes on H.R. 975 which provided for the reduction in the volume of steel imported from foreign countries.

He also voted against H.R. 987 which will delay OSHA from issuing much needed ergonomics standards.
